Superintendent Report

Good News Report

Supt. Bailey congratulated Beckham Houdeshell for winning the 165 lb. division at the State Middle School Wrestling Tournament. He also congratulated the KWLPG Wrestling team and coaches for placing 3rd at the State Team Duals and 4th at the State Tournament. The state qualifiers and state placers included: Bentley Veurink (DNP), Rhys Truman (3rd), Hayes Holter (4th), Johnny Lenz (3rd), Vincent Lenz (3rd), Carter Konechne (2nd), Kenyon Kuiper (4th), Garret Westendorf (3rd), Chris Baas (6th), and Adley Reindl (DNP).

Congratulations to the following students who represented the district at the Middle School All State Band Concert in Mitchell on Saturday, March 7: Kira Kozorik, Jordan Ruen, Mya Backes, Penny Feiok, and Ngan Tran. Also, congratulations to Owen Feiok on being selected for High School All State Band.

Jordan Ruen recently auditioned for the Middle School Honors Performance Series and was selected for participation following a review by the Honors Selection Board. As part of this honor, Jordan will join outstanding young performers from around the world to perform at the world-famous Carnegie Hall in New York City at the end of July. During this experience, he will spend five days in New York participating in rehearsals and educational activities while also exploring the city. Supt. Bailey congratulated Jordan on this extraordinary accomplishment.

Supt. Bailey also congratulated Addison Walstad and Cassie Groon for being selected to play in the SDSU Honor Band Festival.

Superintendent's Report

Budget discussions are intensifying in Pierre as leadership works toward final numbers for the state budget. Schools have set a target of 1.5% for K-12 Public School Funding. There are also some conversations regarding one-time funding. This is great but does not help increase base pay or average teacher salary. The current Certified Master Agreement states that "all certified, classified and administrative staff will receive a one-time stipend of 80% of any one-time money allocated by 2026 legislature, divided by the total number of staff members." Whether one-time dollars materialize will depend largely on what other statewide projects the Legislature chooses to fund and how far above the statutory 10% reserve requirement lawmakers are willing to maintain ending balances.

Notice was received from the State Fire Marshal saying that they will have an inspector in the district on March 17-18.

Supt. Bailey has secured the Platte-Geddes School District a spot in the Education Innovation Research Grant at no cost. The grant is designed to bridge gaps in mental health support, reduce barriers to learning, and empower educators and parents as "helpers". Parents/guardians will have access to all resources from ParentGuidance.org. The only requirement from the district is a signed memorandum of understanding and participation from 5th-8th grade teachers in some professional development. Supt. Bailey will update the board with additional information as it becomes available.

A district administrator will be attending a teacher job fair on April 1 at South Dakota State University. This will be the first time the district has attended a teacher job fair in quite some time.

Supt. Bailey has completed the first draft of the 2026-2027 school calendar. A meeting has not taken place with the school calendar committee yet.

Supt. Bailey reviewed several legislative bills that may impact public education.

Business Manager Report

Two petitions have been picked up from the office for the three open school board positions. Petitions may be picked up and circulated until Tuesday, March 24th.

K. Holter attended the Cracker Barrel in Platte on Saturday, February 14th. Few education bills were discussed and many of the property tax bills did not have momentum yet. Funding for public education may receive 1% but that will not be determined until later in session.

The Northern Plains Insurance Pool (health insurance) annual meeting will be held on Wednesday, March 11th in Huron. The last quarterly report indicated that Platte-Geddes School's loss ratio was at 136%. The district will most likely receive a considerable increase in premiums for the next fiscal year.

K. Holter thanked the workers who helped with the bond election. They put in an extremely long day. Their time and dedication are very much appreciated.

Schoenfish & Co., Inc. performed the audit of the 2024-2025 fiscal year last week. Roxanne Summerville and Tony Schrank attended the exit audit along with Supt. Bailey and Business Manager Kathy Holter.

Secondary Principal Report

The Senior Government class and Mr. Van Essen went to Pierre on Feb. 25. The Seniors met with two legislators and had the opportunity to have great conversations with them.

Mrs. Wynia attended the SDCASE Special Ed Directors meeting and the SPED Conference last week. She came away with many tools to improve our special education department.

On March 10th the Junior Class will be taking the ACT. With this being a new state requirement, the students will be taking the exam in the Core Educational Cooperative conference room. This will allow the other students to continue with a regular school day and will give the Juniors the best opportunity to perform on the ACT.

The following eight seniors have earned their State FFA Degree, which will be awarded in April at the State FFA Convention: Clayton Gustad, Andrew Chaney, Montana Petersen, Mallory Gant, Sutton VanderPol, Kyler Strand, Tucker VanZee, and Dane Jensen.

The FFA Chapter had a successful FFA week with many events that included both the MS/HS students (pie eating contest & Ag Olympics), and the elementary school (petting zoo and elementary ag lessons). Tractor day had record participants with 25 tractors present and community members were thrilled as the tractor

parade made its route past both daycare centers, the assisted living centers, the care center, and down main street. Mrs. Graves thanks everyone for their support and participation in the FFA chapter

School Play Auditions took place on March 3-5. Fifteen students are participating in the school play this year.

Mr. Hunhoff presented a 2026-2027 tentative class schedule to staff on February 26th for their review. All staff have been given time to look over the classes they will be teaching. Mr. Hunhoff met with the elementary staff to review the schedule and discuss with them the conflicts it could create with their specials schedule. Ultimately, modifications will need to be made before students can begin registering for classes. The goal is to begin registering Seniors this week, and work back to track class sizes and adjust student's schedules to ensure that all students are receiving their required graduation courses in person.

Mrs. Caitlin DeGroot is joining The SDAMLE (South Dakota Association of Middle Level Educators) which aims to provide resources and professional development to middle school teachers across the state. A monthly newsletter showcases middle school teachers and their classrooms and provides articles and information for teachers. The SDAMLE offers free book studies for CEU, graduate credits, and hosts a middle school teacher conference in the summer. This summer the group will be working with the SD Teacher of the Year who is also a middle school teacher.

On March 27th, Mrs. Thelen will be taking three students, Cambree Foxley, Emma Samuelson, and Rylee Reddick, to Madison to participate in the DSU Entrepreneurs Competition. These students will compete against three other school districts on Entrepreneurs Pitch. They have the potential of winning \$250.00 and up to \$1000.00, which the students would split amongst the three of them.

Elementary Principal Report

Parent-Teacher conferences were held on February 12th with participation at 91%. Conversations focused on celebrating student growth while identifying ways to continue supporting success at school and at home.

On Feb 18th, the South Dakota Services for the Deaf conducted free student hearing screenings for grades 1st-3rd. If a student doesn't pass the hearing screening, the parents are notified and rescreens, and additional testing is provided free of charge by a pediatric audiologist in Sioux Falls.

On Feb 19th, students in grades 1-6 represented Platte-Geddes at the Missouri Valley Spelling Bee at South Central Elementary in Bonesteel. Those that represented were Wesley Tegethoff, Greysen Wollman, Lily Sibbel, Jameson Antonsen, Talli Graves, Eve Meyerink, Cade Mikuska, Theo Tegethoff, Jayce DeJager, Roslyn Konechne, Eden Kramp, and Jordyn Kirwan. Overall, Platte-Geddes placed 2nd. In the grade-level rounds, Jameson Antonsen placed 3rd in 2nd grade, Talli Graves placed 1st in 3rd grade, & Cade Mikuska placed 1st in 4th grade. Congratulations to those students on a job well done.

On February 25th, PGES kicked off the American Heart Association Wellness Week. Students and families were asked to sign-up online and complete "Finn's Mission" which helps families review their own emergency response plan and how to save a life with Hands-Only CPR. Students also had the choice to fundraise money for AHA to earn individual prizes. The goal was \$1500 and the students raised \$2,894.87. These funds will remain with the regional chapter and will help fund research, education, and community outreach. As a thank you, the school will receive playground equipment and access to apply for health and wellness grants.

Students recently earned a schoolwide PBIS reward by consistently demonstrating positive behaviors and following the panther way. Their collective efforts led to a celebratory ice cream treat for each student. It was a great opportunity to recognize the students' positive choices and reinforce strong, supportive school culture.

On Feb 26th, the elementary staff spent the professional development day collaborating to vertically align the new Phonics curriculum. This is the process of coordinating what is taught across all the grade levels so that skills and content build logically from one year to the next. This helps to ensure that learning targets, instructional strategies, and expectations connect and progress in a clear sequence, avoiding unnecessary gaps or repetition. Our goal is to ensure that there is a coherent learning pathway for the students to develop knowledge and skills smoothly as they move through the grades, resulting in consistent instruction and stronger student outcomes.

On March 3rd, Mr. Jared Peters spent time shadowing Ms. Goodrich in the elementary as part of his educational leadership program. Through this experience, they discussed instructional leadership, school operations, and supporting staff and students.

On March 4th, the 4th graders participated in the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP), often referred to as "The Nation's Report Card." This measures student achievement in reading and math and helps provide a snapshot of how students are performing across the country. Results are reported at the state and national level rather than for individual students or schools.

March 2nd-6th was Read Across America Week and FFA Week. The elementary had dress-up days, petting zoos, Ag lessons in the classroom, and tractor parades. To enhance that readers make leaders, Mrs. Daum cleaned out one of the storage rooms, finding many books to give away to the students. Each student was able to browse and take home 1-2 books.

On April 2nd, PGES will host its annual Kindergarten Round-Up to welcome the class of 2039 and 2040 and their families. Since this day is scheduled as a professional development day with no school, Kindergarten Round-Up will be held at PGES. Scheduling is open now, so all parents who will have a 5-year-old child by September 1, 2026, are encouraged to call the elementary school to schedule a time. All incoming Kindergarten students will be screened, and parents will be provided with the readiness results of their child's screening and be given a recommendation for either the ½-day or full-day Kindergarten program. Screenings are also performed to identify potential disabilities in academic and motor areas. Parents must bring their child's birth certificate and immunization records (exemption forms are available) to the screening.

With the 3rd quarter ending on March 6th, teachers are currently working on grades. Report cards for the elementary will be sent home on Wednesday, March 18th.

Set Driver Education Fee

The driver education fee has been \$190.00 for students enrolled at Platte-Geddes and \$240.00 for other students not enrolled at Platte-Geddes School. The fee has not increased in many years. It is recommended that the fee be increased to \$200.00 for students enrolled at Platte-Geddes and \$250.00 for other students. Motion R. Leader, seconded T. Dyk to set the driver education fees to \$200.00 for Platte-Geddes Students and \$250.00 for students not attending Platte-Geddes School. All members present voted aye. Motion carried.

Appoint Members to Serve on Local Board of Equalization

Motion R. Summerville, seconded T. Schuman appointing M. Petersen to serve on the Platte and Geddes Local Boards of Equalization. All members present voted aye. Motion carried.

Audit Quote

Schoenfish and Co. submitted an audit quote for the 2025-2026 fiscal records in the amount of \$15,000. If the district were subject to a Federal Single Audit, an additional \$1,500.00 would be charged. Currently, it does not appear that this will be required. Motion T. Schuman, seconded R. Leader approving the quote from Schoenfish & Co. to perform an audit of the 2025-2026 records not to exceed \$15,000.00. All members present voted aye. Motion carried.

Canvass Bond Election

Per SDCL 13-4-30 the following information regarding school elections must be provided in the school board minutes:

- The number of registered voters in the school district on the date voter registration closed was 2,350.
- The number of registered voters of the school district who voted in the election was 1067.
- The percentage of registered voters of the school district who voted in the election was 45.4%
- The date of the election was March 3, 2026. It was not held in conjunction with a regular municipal election or with a regular primary election.

The number of ballots with yes votes was 509 or 47.7% and the number of ballots with no votes was 558 or 52.3%, which resulted in a failed bond election. Motion T. Dyk, seconded J. Veurink accepting the

canvassing of the election results from the school bond election. All members present voted aye. Motion carried.

School Bond Vote Discussion

Considerable discussion was held on the next steps following the failed bond election. Supt. Bailey outlined several options for consideration which included holding another bond election in June, delaying until November, sticking with the same construction plan for Phase II, or making modifications. The board of education will be distributing a survey to collect information on the bond vote. This will help them determine how to proceed going forward. Phase I will move forward as planned with completion scheduled for the start of the 2027-2028 school term.

Dakota 15 Food Cooperative Participation Fee

The district received the following information regarding our participation in the Dakota 15 Food Cooperative.

"In order to continue providing high-quality support and expanded services, there will be an increase in the annual participation fee beginning next school year. Updated annual participation cost will be \$8,000. This is the first adjustment of participation fees in several years and has been discussed in depth with our administrative team here at Brandon Valley. Over the past several years, costs associated with training, resources, compliance support, and operational coordination have steadily increased, while the scope and responsiveness of services have also grown. This adjustment will allow us to maintain the level of service you rely on while continuing to strengthen and enhance our offerings."

We have been asked to provide our intent to continue participation ASAP. Motion R. Leader, seconded J. Veurink to continue with participation in the Dakota 15 Food Cooperative at an annual fee of \$8,000.00. All members present voted aye. Motion carried.

2026-2027 Technology Purchases

Mr. Mike Neugebauer is recommending the following technology purchases for the 2026-2027 school year:
